Deacon: Let us attend.

Priest: [Reads the Gospel]

People: Glory to You, O Lord, Glory to You.

After it is read, the Gospel is replaced on the Altar Table. The Holy Doors are closed.

Reader:

For Your holy name's sake, do not abandon us forever; do not annul Your covenant; do not take Your mercy from us, for the sake of Abraham Your beloved, and Isaac Your servant, and Israel Your holy one.

The Trisagion Prayers

Reader: Holy God! Holy Mighty! Holy Immortal! Have mercy on us. (3x)

The Prayer of the Hours

At every season and every hour, in heaven and on earth, You are worshipped and glorified, O Christ our God, long-suffering, merciful, and compassionate; You love the just and show mercy on the sinner; You call all to salvation through the promise of blessings to come: O Lord, in this hour receive our supplications and direct our lives according to Your commandments. Sanctify our souls, hallow our bodies, correct our thoughts, cleanse our minds; deliver us from all tribulations, evil, and distress. Surround us with Your holy angels, that guided and guarded by them, we may attain to the unity of the faith and to the knowledge of Your unapproachable glory, for You are blessed unto ages of ages. Amen.

Lord, have mercy. (3x)

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

More honorable than the Cherubim, and more glorious beyond compare than the Seraphim: without corruption you gave birth to God the Word: true Theotokos, we magnify you.

In the name of the Lord, Father, bless.

The **Priest** comes out to the solea before the Holy Doors, vested only in his epitrachelion; he says:

Priest: May God have compassion on us and bless us,

may He manifest His presence to us and have mercy on us.

Reader: Amen.

Cheesefare Wednesday and Friday, weekdays of Great Lent, and Holy Monday through Wednesday:

The Prayer of Saint Ephraim

Priest:

O Lord and Master of my life, do not permit me the spirit of laziness, despair, lust of power, and idle talk. (*All make a prostration*.)

But give, rather, the spirit of chastity, humility, patience and love to Your servant. (*All make a prostration*.)

O Lord and King, grant me to see my own transgressions and not to judge my brother, for blessed are You unto ages of ages. Amen. (*All make a prostration*.)

¹⁶Then **all** make 12 lesser reverences, saying for each:

O God, cleanse me a sinner and have mercy on me.

The Prayer of Saint Ephraim is repeated, with one prostration at the end.

The Prayer of the Ninth Hour

Reader:

O Master and Lord, Jesus Christ our God, Who are long-suffering towards our sins and have brought us even to this present hour, in which, hanging upon the life-creating Cross, You have opened to the good thief the way into Paradise, and destroyed death by death: be merciful to us, Your humble and sinful and unworthy servants. For we have sinned and transgressed, and we are not worthy to lift up our eyes and look upon the height of heaven, since we have forsaken the path of Your righteousness and have walked according to the desires of our own hearts. But we implore You: in Your boundless goodness, spare us, O Lord, according to the abundance of Your mercy, and save us for Your holy name's sake, for our days are consumed in vanity. Deliver us from the hand of the adversary, forgive us our sins, and kill the passions of the flesh, that

¹⁶ Customarily, Vespers, the Typika, or the Liturgy of the Pre-Sanctified Gifts immediately follows the Ninth Hour. Perhaps because of this, the usual twelve reverences and repetition of the Prayer of Saint Ephraim are omitted by the service books. It might be useful to ignore this difference between the Ninth Hour and the other Hours in the interest of consistent structure.

putting off the old man, we may be clothed with the new, and may live for You, our master and protector; and that so, following Your ordinances, we may attain to eternal rest in the place where all the joyful dwell. For You, O Christ our God, are indeed the true joy and gladness of those that love You, and to You we send up glory, together with Your Father, Who is without beginning, and Your most holy, good, lifecreating Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

If no other service will immediately follow, the **Priest** pronounces the dismissal, facing the people, after which he bows to them, and returns to the Sanctuary:

The Dismissal

The **Priest** bows toward the icon of Christ on the Iconostasis, saying:

Priest: Glory to You, O Christ, our God and our hope, glory to You.

From Ascension to Great and Holy Saturday:

Reader: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit,

now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Lord, have mercy. (3x)

Father, bless.

From Thomas Sunday to the Leave-taking of Pascha:

People: Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and upon

those in the tombs bestowing life!

Standing in front of the Holy Doors, facing the people, the **Priest** says the Dismissal:

Usually, except from Pascha to Thomas Sunday:

Priest: May Christ our true God, through the prayers of His most pure Mother;

[Monday] by the protection of the honorable Bodiless Powers of heaven; [Tuesday] of the honorable and glorious Prophet, Forerunner and Baptist John;

[Wednesday, Friday] by the power of the precious and life-creating Cross;

of the holy, glorious, and all-laudable Apostles;

[*Thursday*] of our Father among the Saints, Nicholas the Wonderworker, Archbishop of Myra in Lycia;

[Saturday] of the holy, glorious and right-victorious Martyrs;

of St. <u>(of the temple.....</u>; of <u>(of the day)</u>, whom we commemorate today; of the holy and righteous ancestors of God, Joachim and Anna; and of all the saints: have mercy on us and save us for He is good and loves mankind.

From Thomas Sunday to the Leave-taking of Pascha:

Reader: Amen.

Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and upon those in the tombs bestowing life! (3x)

And unto us He has given eternal life! Let us worship His resurrection on the third day!
